MARTIN MARIETTA MINING CASE UPDATE

Village officials continue to attend Anderson Township Board of Zoning Appeals (ATBZA) hearings regarding a request for a conditional use permit and related variances required to allow Martin Marietta Materials, Inc. to operate a deep limestone mine in the vicinity of Round Bottom Road and Broadwell Road in Anderson Township. The hearings, which have been continuing since August 2008, are now expected to continue until sometime in October of this year.

The next meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. on September 28, 2009. This meeting will include the cross examination of Martin Marietta witnesses who have been called as rebuttal witnesses in response to testimony provided by expert witnesses who testified on behalf of the mine opponents. The meeting will be held at the Anderson Center, 7850 Five Mile Road in Anderson Township.

Village officials and our legal counsel will continue to attend the hearings and express our concerns about noise, truck traffic, light pollution, and dust pollution. We will also continue to advise residents about the status of the case and any related Village actions in direct mailings to south Indian Hill neighborhoods, future Bulletin articles, and on the Village webpage: www.ihill.org.

BOULES COURT AVAILABLE FOR PLAY

No, it is not a giant sand box. The ten foot by ninety foot sand based court that showed up late this spring in Stephan Field is actually 3 back-to-back-to-back Boules courts which are available for use by residents of all ages. The French game, which is also known as Pentaque, is similar to the Italian game Bocce, and scored just like horseshoes.

The Village received a number of requests for such a court to be installed for the enjoyment of resident families. The court itself cost the Village about \$3,000 to install, and Leslie and Buck Shiels contributed several sets of balls for use by residents who do not have their own. The balls may be signed out at the Rangers Station. A summary of the simple game rules is also available.

RESIDENTIAL AUTOMATIC STANDBY GENERATORS

Over the last several years many residents have questioned whether installing an emergency generator would be a cost effective way to help them deal with electric power needs during power outages. Until recently automatic standby generators were mainly designed handle large commercial, industrial and public buildings, and the costs for such units were prohibitively high for residential installation.

In the last 10 years, a new style of automatic generator for residential use has become available. These light duty generators are designed with cabinets small enough to fit outside almost any home and are fully automatic, requiring no action on the part of the homeowner during a power failure. Most are fueled by your natural gas service or LP gas, and require very little maintenance (similar to a riding lawn mower).

Normally, the residential sized unit will only operate for a few minutes one day a week (an automatically scheduled exercise, day and time pre-determined by the home owner). In the event of a power failure, the unit will start automatically and will begin providing power within 10-15 seconds. When the utility power is restored, the unit will automatically shutdown after a brief cool down cycle.

The capacities of these units varies, some generating just enough power to operate essential circuits - refrigerators, freezers, sump pumps, heating systems, security systems and a few lights while larger units have the capacity to power an entire house. Initial cost, physical size and fuel consumption can vary depending on the capacity of the unit. The costs associated with the purchase and installation of a basic system can range between \$3,500 and \$7,500 while commercial units can cost \$25,000 or more.

Generators should only be installed by a licensed electrician, with all necessary permits and in compliance with building/zoning/safety codes and manufacturers requirements. Your safety and the safety of utility workers depend on them being installed correctly.

While portable generators are readily available, the Village strongly discourages their use due to the following safety concerns:

- 1) Risk of carbon monoxide poisoning from engine exhaust
- 2) Risk of electrocution of the operator/homeowner/utility worker due to a portable generator being connected to a utility service
- 3) Risk of fire while handling/fueling a portable generator with gasoline
- 4) Risk of fire/explosion due to improper storage of gasoline or portable generator.

Portable generators do not “test” themselves by running once a week, as automatic units do. They usually are powered by gasoline, which can go bad after 6 months. If fresh fuel is not kept on hand or it has not been properly tested and maintained, the portable unit may not operate when needed.

Several manufacturers provide automatic home generators, including Generac, Cummins/Onan, Kohler, and Briggs & Stratton and all can provide a list of approved installers for our area. The Village may also be able to negotiate discount pricing for groups of residents interested in purchasing automatic standby generators. If you have an interest in pursuing a group purchase arrangement please contact the Village offices at 561-6500 to indicate your interest. This is the second printing of this same article in the Bulletin so, if you have previously called to indicate your interest, there is no need to call again.

Power outages can at the very least be an inconvenience and lengthy outages becoming very expensive with the potential for frozen pipes, spoiled refrigerated/frozen foods and in extreme cases, temporary housing costs. An automatic generator may give you peace of mind while at home or away.

RANGER HEADQUARTERS READY FOR OCCUPANCY

The construction on the Village Administration and Ranger Station will reach a major milestone the 1st of September when the Rangers move into their new headquarters. Construction activity will shift at the same time to the renovation and expansion of the Village Administrative Offices, including a new handicapped accessible Council Chambers. The Ranger phase of the project began in January of 2009, and took about a month longer than expected to complete mainly due to wet weather early in the project. The Village is still hoping to complete the remainder of the expansion project before the end of 2009.

The project has necessitated the shifting of some staff offices during construction and another shift will occur when the Rangers take occupancy in September. All Ranger personnel will be relocated to their new space during the first week of September. During the last 8 months, the patrol offices have been working out of the existing Council Chambers, the detectives have been temporarily in the Phinney House, and the dispatchers have been operating out of a temporary office on the Administration side of the building. All the operations will now join back up together in the new facility.

During the rest of 2009, the Water Works billing office, the payroll operations, and the City Manager’s Administrative Assistant will continue to be housed in the Phinney House. The City Manager, Assistant City Manager, Finance Director, Project Manager, and Court Clerk/Receptionist will be relocated to temporary offices within the new Ranger headquarters. The existing main lobby and Administration Offices will be renovated as part of Phase 2, so visitors will need to be reoriented on how to find key staff members during this phase.

Visitors to the Ranger Station and the four Administration offices that will be temporarily relocated there will need to first come to a temporary information window located on the Drake Road side of the building, just north of the existing main building entrance. This window will be manned by a Ranger Dispatcher and the Court Clerk/Receptionist. From this window, visitors will be directed to a secure entrance on the north end of the building where they will be greeted by the person they are visiting to gain access.

Anyone visiting the offices to pay a water bill, conduct Village Bulletin business, pick up general Village information, and/or visit the Recreation, Tax, or Health Departments will find these offices in the Phinney House. The access drive has now been shifted slightly to the west, directly across from the Fire Department driveway off Shawnee Run Road. A mulch access path has been installed from the Phinney House to the Ranger Dispatch window to help visitors find offices which are housed in one or the other buildings.

We apologize for any inconveniences due to access problems while we complete the second phase of the project. Everyone should be back in their permanent locations by January 1, 2010. Please note that all Village staff will maintain the same phone numbers during the construction.

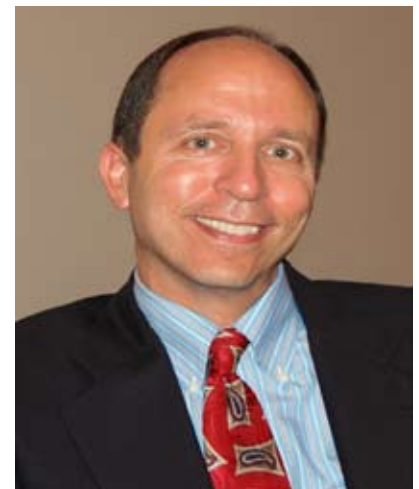

INDIAN HILL WATER WORKS GETS NEW CHEMICAL FEED BUILDING

In late 2008, the Indian Hill Water Works (IHWW) started construction on a new chemical feed building. This facility is replacing a chemical feed system that has been in place for over 25 years and reached its life expectancy. During the design phase of this project, IHWW decided to upgrade from chlorine gas to liquid chlorine. Chlorine gas can be very dangerous for the people handling it, as well as for everyone around the facility in which it is stored. With this in mind, IHWW chose to use liquid chlorine. This chemical is more “user” friendly and reduces the safety risk for those around the treatment plant. On July 6, the chemical feed pumps were started and began to feed chemicals from the new facility. This new structure houses all three of the chemicals that the IHWW uses, as well as the pump that are needed to inject them into the system. With this new addition to the water treatment plant, IHWW will continue to provide the quality water that our customers have come to expect in a safer manner.

LOOKING FOR VOLUNTEERS WITH MEDICAL LICENSURE OR CERTIFICATION

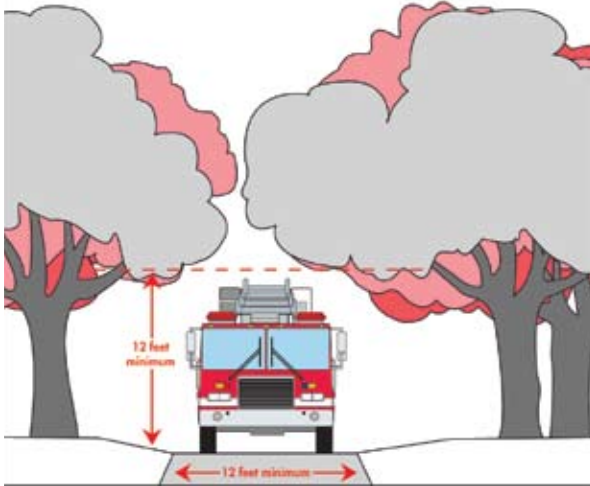

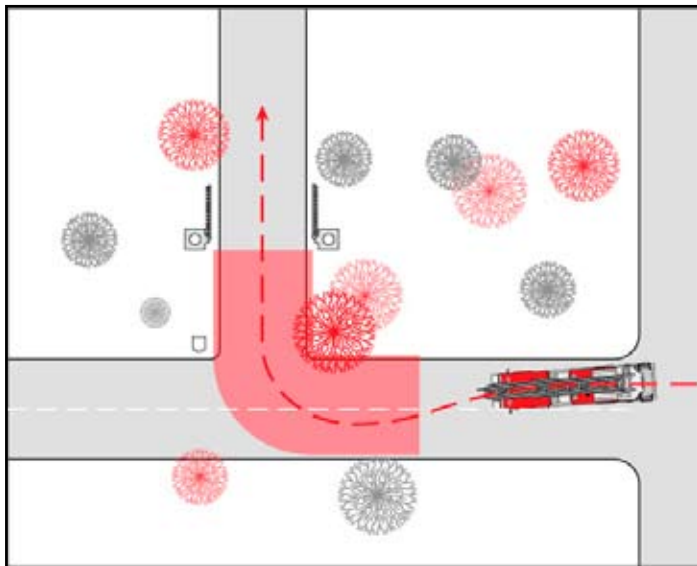

Louis Prince of Indian Hill

Louis Prince of Indian Hill was one of 10 elderly men from all parts of Ohio who received medals for their valor more than six decades ago, when they were young men in uniform fighting to save the world.

Mr. Prince was one of three from Southwest Ohio who became Chevaliers of the Legion of Honor, the greatest award the French government can give to a foreigner. Each of them received a letter from Pierre Vimont, France’s ambassador to the United States, telling they had been chosen to receive the medal and how grateful the French people are for their help in freeing France from Nazi oppression.

The French people, Vimont wrote, “will never forget your courage and your devotion to the great cause of freedom.”

The French government put out the call for nominees through service organizations and state and local veterans affairs offices that France wanted to acknowledge the service of its American liberators while they were still living.

The men from the Cincinnati area, Louis Prince of Indian Hill, Tom Jennings of Milford, and Art Schumate of Middletown met for the first time in Columbus, when they were presented their medals by Lt. Gov. Lee Fischer

All three insist that they were not heroes, just young men-in-uniform, often scared, always homesick, who simply did their duty.

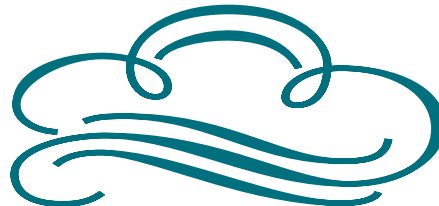

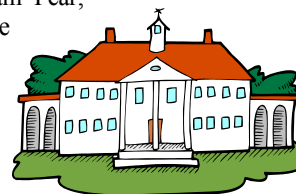

From sticky notes to coffee cups, business and home offices are overflowing with all sorts of handy products made from natural resources. While these products play a vital role in making an office run smoothly, many of us are in the habit of using far more of those products than we really need ---a bad habit that wastes not only resources, but money as well. To keep your waste flow low and your money savings high, streamline your office with these helpful work waste reduction tips.

Use paper wisely

While there's no avoiding the use of paper in the office, there are plenty of ways to reduce paper waste. First, take advantage of your wireless communications. Instead of leaving paper messages in your coworker's inbox, shoot her an email instead: since most people check their email more frequently than their office inbox, chances are she'll receive the electronic message more quickly than by hard copy and send you a speedier response as well.

Also try sending any newsletters via email instead of print. The switch could save you loads of paper and toner in the long haul. Finally, before you print your own electronic files and emails stop and ask yourself: is a hard copy of this item really necessary? "

A Look Back at the Swing Line

In the early twentieth century, an electric railway went through Indian Hill. The interurban line was named the Cincinnati and Columbus Traction Company, but was also referred to as the Swing Line (for its major investors), the Hillsboro Short Line (a destination), or the Green Line (for the color of its cars).

Judge Peter Swing and his two attorney sons, along with Henry Burkhold, A.J. Becht, and Frank Suire incorporated the company in 1901 investing \$10,000. The group hoped to attract additional investors, make a profit, and provide transportation between Cincinnati and the state capital. Franchises had to be obtained from towns along the route, allowing the C&C to lay track and feed wire. A major problem was that other syndicates sought to build interurban lines through or to the same places.

After Oakley turned down the C&C, Norwood became the terminus for the line. The local paper lauded this contract, stating, “It will make Norwood a central point and people will be able to travel in all directions for 5 cents.” The C&C route started at Harris Avenue went to Duck Creek Road, along Ridge Road to Madison Road, along the B&O railroad tracks to downtown Madeira, where a station was located on Miami Road. Then the line followed Camargo Road, veering right to the center of current day Indian Hill at the corner of Drake and Shawnee Run Roads. There it stopped at the Ramona Station, which was located where the current Village Administration Building is. From there it went behind the elementary school, descended into Redbird Hollow, and continued to Given Road, then crossed a creek near Steppingstones Center, and proceeded to go across the Little Miami River into Milford. Then it went through Clermont County hamlets, including Perintown, Stonelick, Monterey, and Marathon; then through Brown County and ended up in Highland County at Hillsboro. The entire route was 53 miles long.



In 1906, the C&C started operations. There were 4 regular trains and 2 express cars. It took around 2 hours for regular trains and 1 ¼ hours for the express to travel between Norwood and Hillsboro. The cars ran on rails, with overhead cables. The handsome chrome green cars were elegantly appointed, with mahogany finished interiors, plush upholstered seats, empire ceilings, and toilets and racks for parcels. The cars were enclosed in winter and open sided in summer. Each car was 57 feet long, and the trains could travel as fast as 50 mph. Both the motorman and the conductor wore blue uniforms.

At first the C&C was a popular alternative to horses and regular railroads. People rode from one location to another, and a variety of freight was carried, including milk, coal, fertilizer, livestock, lumber, agricultural implements, and farm produce. The C&C was popular for group outings – to the Cincinnati Zoo or the Clermont County Fair. Commuters used it to get to work at factories in Norwood. And because Hillsboro and Milford were temperance towns, passengers often rode the interurban to saloons in nearby wet villages.

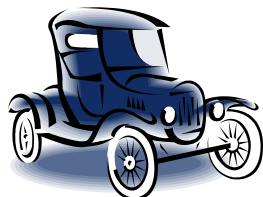
But problems arose. The C&C was never able to consolidate with other interurban companies. The bridge to Milford collapsed; income was marginal. And the advent of the automobile eventually doomed all interurban railways. In 1919, the company was insolvent, so operations ceased, and by 1920 the line was dismantled and the real estate was sold.

Remnants of the C&C can be seen locally. The Madeira station is currently a retail building. Near Steppingstones Center and in the Little Miami River, remains of the abutments that once supported lines are visible. These vestiges of the Swing Line serve as reminders of travel in an earlier era.
